Budget

Governor Bruce Rauner proposed a 6.7% increase in general school spending. The increase would amount to a \$300 million boost in general state aid, the main pot of state dollars for education. However, it remains unclear how he plans to pay for the education increase as the state faces an estimated \$5 billion shortfall next year. Still, Rauner's office said that "Gov. Rauner has made it clear that education is the #1 issue facing our state. His goal is to have worldclass schools educating all children in Illinois."

Lions Quest is a K-12 comprehensive youth development program that promotes social and emotional learning (SEL), character education, bullying prevention, drug awareness, and service-learning.

Lions Quest features three developmentally appropriate program levels: Skills for Growing (Grades K-5), Skills for Adolescence (Grades 6-8), and Skills for Action (Grades 9-12). These programs promote a caring, safe, well-managed, and participatory learning environment, and allows students to develop 21st century life skills.

Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers



(PARCC)

Over 30 states have prepared to take the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) test in an effort to test student knowledge of the Common Core Standards in the areas of Mathematics and English/Language Arts. Most of these tests will be administered via digital devices, although some school districts have opted to take the tests paper-and-pencil. Over 4 million students across the nation will take this comprehensive assessment tool. Helpful hints to preparing for the PARCC are as follows: (Teachhub)

- **Students** need to have a **familiarity** with taking tests on-line.
- Use **keyboards**, number pads, understand highlighting and drag-and-drop.
- **Stamina** is also very important. Students need to work on computers for long periods of time.
- * Knowledge of **tech problems** and what to do needs to be discussed ahead of time.
- **Teachers** must also become familiar with taking tests on-line in order to aid the students.



Digital Curriculum

In March, **Pearson** and **Houghton Mifflin Harcourt** will allow teachers in Galesburg Schools to review their **on-line curriculum** for **free**. We would like to have **two Math** and **English/Language Arts** teachers in each grade try-out one of the programs. Common Assessments

A common assessment is any means of measuring student performance that meets these criteria for: Content of the test, Timing of the test, Use of the results. Common Assessments also build a team of efficiency among teachers. If five teachers are teaching the same course or grade level and are responsible for ensuring all students acquire the same knowledge and skills, it makes sense those teachers would work together to determine the best methods to assess student learning. Teachers working in isolation replicate and duplicate effort. They work hard, but they do not work as diligently as a team. (Dufour). Also, our students in Galesburg Schools are very mobile. We need to provide students with consistent teaching practices and expectations.

Nationwide, each year, over **1.9 million** students will be suspended from school. Another **1.5 million** students will have multiple suspensions, and over **130,000** students will be expelled (CRDC). Providing school based supports for struggling students whose behavior repeatedly **disrupts their** education as well as the education of others is paramount. In order to provide students with supports, Galesburg Schools will be partnering with the NAACP to provide our students with a Restorative Justice Program. Currently, two schools, **Steele** Elementary and Galesburg High School are slowly implementing aspects of this doctrine. Essentially, the program involves three tiers: Building classroom circles to talk about concerns and peerto-peer relationships, Smaller **groups** are used to bring together harmed students and their offenders with adult and peer mediation, and **Reintegration** of students following suspensions.
