Student Growth


In Illinois, student growth is defined as:

"A measurable change in a student's or group of student's knowledge or skills between two or more points of time"

Comparing student knowledge at two or more points in time distinguishes student growth from achievement, where only one assessment is utilized to analyze knowledge. PERA defines assessment by three different types:

Type I Standardized Tests – MAP, ISAT, AIMSweb
Type II School District Tests – Curriculum / Textbook Tests
Type III Teacher Collaboration – Common Assessments/Performance

At this time, we are asking that teachers begin collaborative work on common assessments in their disciplines during Grade Level Meetings, Early Dismissals, and Team Time. The goal of formulating these assessments is to improve student learning.

ISBE & Culturally Responsive Teaching

The ISBE is encouraged by the potential of RTI models to improve educational opportunities for culturally and linguistically diverse students and to reduce their disproportionate representation in special education. At the same time, they are concerned that if we do not engage in dialogue about how culture mediates learning, RTI models will simply be wasted. In the Galesburg School System, we have students who speak over 12 different languages from all over the world. We also have a large population of African American, Hispanic, and African students.

Also, considerable research (Delgado-Gaitan & Trueba 1991; Halcón 2001; Moll 2001; Ogbu 2001) indicates, however, that teachers who do not share children's cultures can provide culturally compatible instruction if they understand the children's "cultural funds of knowledge," which can be thought of as the different ways of knowing, communicating, and doing that exist within diverse homes (Moll 1994, 2001).



School **culture** is the set of norms, values and beliefs, rituals and ceremonies, symbols and stories that make up the school. Our goal in Galesburg #205 is to foster positive school cultures.

The RCA team has some tools to help promote this type of environment. It is called. Tools For Triumph. We want to encourage all schools to post them in your halls and encourage all faculty, staff, students and parents to utilize these tools:

What is going on in Galesburg Community Unit School District #205?

Each week, we have members of our faculty and staffs attend trainings and workshops. Several of our teachers are experimenting with *The Flipped Classroom* teaching method. Educational technology and activity learning are the major components of this framework. Students are able to watch lectures of their teachers at home at their own pace. They communicate with peers and the teacher through online discussions. Instead of lectures, class time is reserved for collaborative activities and mastery exercises.

Start with the end in mind, is driving the curriculum planning of many teachers. *Backwards Planning* is nothing new. However, educators often forget to use this concept. Starting with the end means we put the skills, knowledge, and concepts *first*, then the product **second**. *Curriculum planning* with the *Backward Design* involves:

- Reviewing Standards
- Listing skills, concepts, and knowledge students must gain
- Create lessons that lead up to the end
- > Mastery of a final project or skill
- ➤ A final assessment
- > Reflecting on the process

On **Veterans Day**, Nielson faculty had veterans from several wars come in and speak to their classes. Arranging to have guest speakers is not a free day for teachers. It is a lot of work. Finding people with expertise in a given area can be difficult. However, guest speakers offer our students the opportunity to have access to current,, realistic information that is not in the curriculum.
